#### Message from Rev Keith Thomasson....

My prayer for you is that during Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany prayer becomes real. Encounter with God through Jesus is renewed. Worship becomes a joy.



It was a delight to be part of the organisation team that with Bishop Kevin and Dean Reuben shaped the Diocesan Clergy Conference, Bricks without Straw. We stayed at the Buchanan Arms in Drymen, explored the vastly different contexts of Dumbarton and Helensburgh, and climbed Conic Hill. We worshipped, learned, ate, and spent time in the cosy bar together. I love being part of this diocese and value my colleagues immensely.

Bricks without Straw has three strands: Spirituality, Mission, and Finance. Following a diocesan-wide consultation, in which we participated, the emerging ideas fed into three sessions each led by a skilled external speaker, namely Alison Clark, Diana Hall and Dave Richards. Below I outline some of my main take-aways from Alison. I begin with comments on personal spirituality, then turn to the spirituality of the Vestry, and the spirituality of the congregation. We are invited to pray as though God is real, and the more we hope to do the more we should pray. We pray as we can. We shout out loud. We pray with gratitude. For, we cannot be simultaneously anxious and grateful. Thomas Traherne was called to mind. Here are words from his poem, **Eden**,

Joy, pleasure, beauty, kindness, glory, love,

Sleep, day, life, light,

Peace, melody, my sight,

My ears and heart did fill and freely move.

All that I saw did me delight.

The Universe was then a world of treasure,

To me an universal world of pleasure.

There is a crucial link between prayer and action, and sometimes we just pray, or we just act without prayer. In the words of the Franciscan monastic, Richard Rohr, 'Action without contemplation is the work of hamsters and gerbils'.

Alison posed several questions for personal reflection, and I offer these to you:

- What helps you feel close to God?
- What are the barriers to maintaining your own spiritual health?
- What do you need to support your spiritual health?

Perhaps with Troon in mind, Alison asked, 'How does your golf relate to spirituality?' Of course, you can substitute whatever you like doing for golf in this question.

Alison turned her attention to the spiritual life of the Charge in which we serve. The spiritual welfare of the Vestry is of paramount importance, and this is enshrined in Canon 60. Alison asked:

- Do we expect God to be involved?
- Do we pray as though God is real?

Alison asked who commissioned their Vestries using text from Canon 60. One hand went up.

Alison commended the importance of Vestries 'dwelling in the Word'. She also pointed out that this often led to shorter meetings. Again, asking who facilitated this within their context, one hand went up. The challenge for us is carrying this learning into our meetings, and making it present at all our meetings. Finally, Alison considered the spirituality of the congregation. She explained this was about the spiritual welfare of all to enable them to be 'living stones'. Holding onto scripture and being steeped in scripture, encouraging an active prayer life, praying for others, receiving prayer ministry, introducing silence, and introducing pilgrimage were all suggestions. Clearly offering prayer ministry and going away together are welcome suggestions and everything else, whilst present in our corporate life, should be further developed.

Alison ended by recalling the words of Isaiah. That we are called to be 'repairers of the breach'.

Within society, within the natural world, within our communities. What a vocation! Healing, healing, healing.

I wonder how you will receive this message of spiritual nurture? With excitement? With desire? With reluctance? With a great big YES?

In the next edition of the newsletter, I will share with you the insights from the Mission presentation given by Diana, whose church recently won a national award.

## **KNITTING FOR MISSION TO SEAFARERS**

When Rev. Tim Tunley, Chaplin to Mission to Seafarers, visited St Ninian's recently he spoke about knitting woollen hats for the seamen. Here is a pattern to knit these hats, in any colour, including black. He hopes to arrange another visit next year to receive any donations we have gathered.



You will need:

Double knit or 4 ply wool. Size 8 (4mm) Needles. 2 oz of wool. (60g)

Cast on 120 stitches. Rib (2 plain 2 purl ) for 12 inches

Next Row: Knit 2 together to end of the row Purl next row.

Repeat these two rows once more.

Knit 1 row. Purl 1 row.

Pull thread through all stitches and sew up seam.

#### **PROPERTY MAINTENANCE REPORT - NOVEMBER 2023** <u>Rectory inspection 31 May.</u>

- The work of installing electrical extractor fans has been further inspected by the plumbers and myself. Some changes to specification needed before proceeding after discussion with Rector. Advice being sought in terms of electrical specification. *Ongoing*.
- The trellis fencing between the Rectory and the adjacent property has disintegrated or come away from brick wall. Tenders to be sought. *Ongoing*.

Ceiling lights for the hall have been delivered 11 November 2023. Installation to take place after Christmas. Cost of lights £1,600.

Heating schedule for winter months' had been set for church and hall. Further adjustments to be made due to complaints of inadequate temperature in church. *Will continue to monitor*.

The strip light at the organ foot well has broken. New <u>•c</u> LED light strip to be installed. Temporary light in place.

Annual gas boiler maintenance due for Church, Rectory and three flats at Sandilands in December.


Clearing of gutters at Church and Rectory to take place this month once leaf fall completed.



## ST NINIAN'S GARDEN UPDATE

The last few months have seen a lot of activity around the community garden. We had a lovely garden party with 20 people at the end of September. We shared what we hoped for the garden in one or a few words: .....they will Love it, find Peace, Praise God for it, find Sanctuary and Community, Joy, Ecology and Resources.



At the beginning of October, we had a positive meeting with residents from Sandilands, it was good to get to know each other and share ideas. From this meeting has come the idea to use the saplings that the woodland trust has donated as a hedge that will provide privacy, a sense of safety and seclusion and of course a haven for wildlife. We also agreed that when the garden starts to be in use there will be times it will be open and times it will not be open.

The fifteen little trees from the Woodland Trust have arrived, and we are awaiting final approval from the diocese to plant them. Our pre-application for permission to plant the trees has been approved and our application will be discussed in December. If all goes well, we will have a tree-planting party mid-December!

It is also wonderful to be working with the people from Re-Pollinate (a charity Hewlett-Packard work with) who are helping both with financing and designing the garden. We are hoping that later this spring a water butt, a compost bin, some storage for tools and a few raised beds will find their way into our garden.


## **SCOTTISH PILGRIMAGE TO WALSINGHAM – 2023**

This was my second visit to the "The Shrine of Our Lady Walsingham" as part of a small number of Episcopalians, who went on the Scottish Pilgrimage over the weekend of September 22 to 25 and happily I was once again one of them.

We left Glasgow on a coach at 8.20am joining other pilgrims from Edinburgh on the way to Norfolk; finally arriving at Walsingham at 5.30pm.

After being shown our accommodation and eating our evening meal, we all made our first visit to the Shrine Church for a service of welcome and thanksgiving.

Over the next two days a programme of worship had been arranged for us, intertwined with the services that were on throughout the day at the Shrine, which you could attend if you wished.





The extra services I attended were the "Stations of the Cross"; "The Homily and Procession of our Lady and Benediction"; this was a candle light procession around the grounds of the Shrine. Also the "Sprinkling, Procession of the Blessed Sacrament and Benediction,"

involving going down to the well and being blessed with its water. After the "Sprinkling" I felt as if I had been cleansed.

On Sunday we all attended the Parish Church of St. Mary's for Mass in the morning and in the afternoon took the opportunity to visit the Slipper Chapel, where the pilgrims left their shoes to walk the last mile to the Shrine in bare feet.

The ambiance of Walsingham has an atmosphere of calm, a togetherness with the other Pilgrims from all around the UK; and of the friendships made. It is wonderful to worship with so many likeminded Christians. Walsingham has again reinforced my faith. I was asked if I would serve while I was at Walsingham, "what an honour and privilege", at our two Eucharist services. You will see from the photo I was robed in a Cassock and Cotta.

It is programmed that there is free time and I took the opportunity to ride on the narrow gauge steam railway from Walsingham to Wells-next-to-the-Sea. Walsingham Village is delightful, untouched by the modern world,

## THE COMING OF THE CHRIST

As we observe Advent and Christmas in the twenty-first century, it is worth reviewing a first-century Christian take on the coming of the Christ by rereading some of Christianity's oldest texts, particularly the Gospels.



If we lament Christianity's waning in a post-Christian age, it is worth asking what Christians projected in a pre-Christian age. What did our forebears in the faith think about the coming of the Christ before the disciples were called 'Christians' (Acts 11.26)?

This Series considers this question in three parts. First, what Jesus means when he says that he has come down to earth from heaven (Jn 6.38). On the one hand, the coming of the Christ had been anticipated in Judaism for centuries; on the other hand, the first Christians had to interpret the Old Testament to read the signs of their times.

Second, Jesus tells us he came to save the world (Jn 3: 17). The coming of the Christ, in what St Paul calls 'the fullness of time' (Gal. 4:4-7), inaugurates a series of events yet unfinished until the Christ comes again 'that God may be all in all' (1 Cor. 15: 28). Third, Simeon prophesies bewilderingly about the Christ child. Whilst Simeon rejoices in the salvation wrought in the Christ, who is 'revelation for the Gentiles' and 'glory for Israel', he discloses that the baby Jesus is 'a sign of contradiction' (Lk. 2: 25 - 36).

The Series is offered on the Mondays of Advent 2023 at 7pm (GMT) on YouTube as a resource for individuals or groups to use creatively during the Season of Advent.

Presenter: Rev Canon Prof Michael Hull, Principal and Pantonian Professor of Divinity, Scottish Episcopal Institute.



## NATIONAL CHURCH AWARDS

Two Scottish Episcopal Churches have been announced as winners at the 2023 National Church awards, organised by the National Churches Trust.

St Anne's, Dunbar won in the Scotland Category of the Nayler Award for Excellence in Church Maintenance, and St James the Great, Stonehaven won the Church and Community Volunteer Award, run in partnership with the Marsh Charitable Trust. The awards were presented at a ceremony in London on 6 November.

St James the Great was commended for its community work in Stonehaven and the surrounding area. "I am very pleased to have been able to receive this award on behalf of the people of St James the Great and the wider Stonehaven community" said the Rev Mary Jepp,

Priest-in-charge at St James. "I strongly believe for any church to survive and flourish, we need to be embedded in the community. Much of the work we have been doing at Saint James was



sparked by being out and about in the community."

St James runs a weekly refugee drop-in programme as well as a community garden in the grounds of the church alongside the Inspire Charity in Stonehaven, an employability-focused day service for adults with learning disabilities. This project has also attracted the support of other local groups including the Men's Shed and the Masons.

Rev Mary continues: "This award is hugely appreciated, and it attests to the fact that we don't think of ourselves as volunteers in addition to our faith. It is because of our faith that we are all called. For us in Stonehaven it's about being open to that call, responding, and allowing the creative spirit to wriggle its way in without getting too hung up on yourself."

St Anne's, Dunbar was given the award in recognition of its recent maintenance projects. The Buildings Convener at St Anne's, Mike Ling, said: "The application of skills towards the care and maintenance of a listed religious building is an expression of worship and at the same time a privilege. It is also an opportunity to apply the skills acquired over one's working life for the benefit of the community, to learn about specialist maintenance techniques."

Much of the work of the congregation is carried out by volunteers. Mr Ling continued: "Bringing people together to undertake tasks allows connections to be made and strengthens relationships."

St Anne's collaborates with many different organisations across the town including Dunbar Primary and Grammar Schools, Sustaining Dunbar, Belhaven Hill School, East Lothian Council and The Ridge, to continue to strengthen the social fabric of the community.

The congregation's Rector, The Rev Diana Hall, said "I'm delighted to see the hard work and dedication of Mike and our other volunteers recognised in this way. Our church building is an important focal point, but church is also so much more than a building. It's a



community of love and hope with an amazing story to tell. It makes an important contribution to our common life. We look forward to continuing to explore how St Anne's and its people can serve and work with other organisations to be a blessing in Dunbar and beyond."
